Wayne County Public Health provides lead tests free of charge and receives referrals from the clinic system. Our office completed 25 tests this year, which is lower than usual. WIC had been providing lead testing at WIC clinics which is held monthly. FY 2015 they had tested 67 children from Oct. 2014 through Dec. 2014. They no longer test on a regular basis, just if requested, but continue to do the lead screening, and will make referrals to the clinic or WCPH.
